

South Toledo Bend State Park

Set on scenic bluffs overlooking
Toledo Bend Lake. Bald eagles nest
in the area and winter around the
area of the dam. In winter large
rafts of waterfowl can be seen
from the shore and consist of large
groups of diving ducks, including
canvasbacks, redheads, and scaup.
On occasion, loons, gulls, and terns
have been seen.

Hodges Gardens State Park

Contains seven hundred acres of both wild and cultivated plants inside a large impoundment. It is home to many of the same species found at Kisatchie, as well as a bluebird trail.

Vernon Parish Lakes

On either Anacoco or Vernon Lake you might spot any of a variety of waterfowl and aquatic birds, egrets, herons, osprey, and the occasional Bald Eagle.

Kisatchie National Forest

Longleaf pine ecosystem, with several ponds, pitcher plant bogs and baygalls. Birds to be found in the area are the endangered Red Cockaded Woodpecker, Bachman's Sparrow, Brown Headed Nuthatch, Eastern Wild Turkey, and a variety of wood warblers and other passerine species.



Vernon Parish...

The "pine dwellers" prefer to live exclusively in pine forests. None of these five are migratory, but remain in Vernon Parish year round. Destruction of their favored habitats has jeopardized all five species to some extent, but with re-forestation, all are making a strong comeback. Of the five, the Red-cockaded Woodpecker (RCW) was at greatest risk since it will only build its nest in a living pine tree.

It takes anywhere from one to three years for a woodpecker to bore out a cavity large enough to hold a nest. One way that Rangers at Kisatchie National Forest encourage their continued habitation, is by drilling holes in trees located in nesting areas throughout the forest. These nesting areas are clearly marked and should not be disturbed.


The little Bachman's Sparrow usually builds a domed nest on the ground near a bush or clump of grass. You might have noticed a Brown-Headed Nuthatch going head-first down a tree trunk – not knowing that this behavior is as unusual for birds as it would be for humans.

The nests of the brightly colored Pine Warbler are deep, open cups near the end of a branch; they feed off the pines as well, poking their tiny bills into the cones to eat the seeds.

Other birds will venture into the pine forests, including the Pileated Woodpecker, Barred Owl, and Ruby-Throated Hummingbird, but they are equally at home in deciduous forests.
